Local Funder

HOW TO USE THIS INFORMATION

This booklet contains information on funders that may fund local voluntary organisations and community groups. **If you are not a registered charity** check with the funder to see if you are eligible.

Once you have identified a funder that you wish to apply to, you will need to obtain the funder's guidelines to make sure that your project meets their criteria. Rather than trying to make your project fit the criteria, look for funders who like to give money to your type of organisation or project.

Different Types of Grant

Some funders will only give **Capital** grants (one-off grants to buy a specific item or items) or **Revenue** grants (to cover salaries and running costs). Others may give both. Before making an application check that individual funders are willing to offer the type of grant that you need.

Help with Researching Funders and Completing Funding Applications

While this booklet identifies some key local and national funders, there are often new funding opportunities. CVS Development Workers Hannah and Jane are happy to help you identify the best funders to start with; to do a more detailed search for you or to read through a draft application.

CVS has access to an Internet search facility, Grantfinder and access to a variety of other sources of funding information. We also have copies of A Guide to the Major Trusts, A Guide to Local Trusts in the North of England and The Guide to UK Company Giving. We cannot lend these copies out but you are welcome to come and look through them at the CVS office.

Who and what will it fund?

(Community)

Who and what will it fund?

A small grant scheme designed to assist groups operating in the District of Lancaster to undertake small projects that enable their local people to take part in community activities.

Capital costs? Yes

Revenue costs? Yes

How much will it give?

Up to £2,000. One or more applications up to £2,000 can be submitted up until the end of March 2010.

Miscellaneous Grants: These are often advertised in August to be spent by March the following year. Grants of up to £500 are available for small voluntary projects.

All organisations receiving funding over £1,000 have a Service Level Agreement. The City Council currently funds 10 non-housing voluntary organisations.

THE PERCY BILTON CHARITY

Who and what will it fund? Registered UK charities only whose primary objectives are to assist one or more of the above groups.

Capital costs? Yes

Revenue costs? No

How much will it give? There are 2 funding programmes:
Large grants: one-off payments for capital expenditure of £2,000 and over
Small grants: one-off payments of up to £500

Applications: No application form. Applications should be made on your organisation's headed notepaper and must include information specified in the trusts guidelines.

Other information: The Board meets in March, June, September and December to consider large grants. Applications should be received by the 5th day of the preceding month. Small grants are considered on an ongoing basis throughout the year. The charity may be contacted by telephone or in writing for advice and guidance about submitting an application.

LANCASHIRE ENVIRONMENTAL FUND (LEF) (Environment, conservation, community & young people)

Who and what will it fund? Any not for profit organisation in Lancashire whose work involves one of the following objectives:

1. Providing and maintaining public amenities and parks, within 10 miles of a landfill site, when the work benefits the natural social or built environment.
2. The provision, conservation, restoration or enhancement of a natural habitat, maintenance or recovery of a species.
3. Restoring and repairing buildings which are for religious worship, or architectural or historical interest within 10 miles of a landfill site.

How much will it give? There are 3 funding programmes: **Community Chest** will award between £3,000 and £15,000 but the overall cost of the project should not exceed £30,000.

Dirtworks aimed at organisations that have the capacity to deliver a project with young people aged 16-25years. Project should not exceed £25,000 and capital works should be at least 40% of overall project cost.

Strategic Fund will give grants of up to £25,000 but overall costs of the project should not exceed £250,000.

LANCASHIRE SMALL SITES RECLAMATION PROGRAMME

(Environmental)

Who and what will it fund? Any community group that is committed to improving their local environment, planning projects such as community gardens, allotment regeneration, improvements to public open spaces, playground regeneration and wildlife habitat enhancement. Projects must demonstrate a high degree of community benefit or display links to wider agendas such as health, education, arts, waste management, or countryside access. The best schemes will be projects based on genuinely derelict and previously developed land.

Capital costs? Yes.

Revenue costs? Yes.

How much will it give? Up to £15,000. Typically funding around 40% of the total project costs. There is a lower limit of £500.

LANCASHIRE ARTS DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

(Arts)

Who and what will it fund? This fund is for projects that deliver county wide; include educational outreach; and offer opportunities for involvement by those experiencing social and economic deprivation or discrimination.

Strategic Funding: Grants are normally allocated to organisations that are also receiving funds from Arts Council England.

Project and Development Funding: will normally be considered up to 50% of the total arts expenditure, primarily artist's fees.

How much do they give? There are limited amounts for development and strategic work. Enquire about the likely amount you can apply for.

Applications: There are four funding rounds a year. Application forms can be downloaded from the website.

- Improved rural and urban environments, which more people are able to enjoy
- Healthier and more active people and communities.

Capital costs?

Yes: a maximum of £50,000 for capital grants

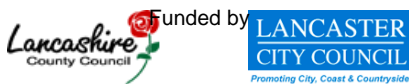
